

A Verse for the New Year

As we anticipate our centennial year, our designated verse (Psalm 100:5) reminds us that God's goodness and love endures forever and God's faithfulness continues through all generations. This should inspire us to continue the providential work that began in 1925 through Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary.



One highlight of verse 5 is God's faithfulness. We often ask for God's faithfulness to help us in a present situation. Sometimes we ask for God's faithfulness when we anticipate a future problem. In either case, faith is seen as forward-looking. But God's faithfulness is also backward-looking-- to recall what God has already done in our lives. It's interesting that the name of the first calendar month originates from the Roman god Janus, who is depicted with a head with two faces --one looking backward and the other looking forward. It's as if one can't begin to enter the new year without first looking back at the past year. God's faithfulness is a lot like that.

May this centennial year for our community be filled with times of looking back at God's faithfulness, so that we can embrace the present and the unknown future with hope. *Amen.*
